Executive Summary

DHS secures our Nation's air, land, and sea borders to prevent unauthorized activity while facilitating lawful travel and trade. DHS's border security and management efforts focus on three interrelated goals: effectively securing U.S. air, land, and sea borders; safeguarding and streamlining lawful trade and travel; and disrupting and, in coordination with other federal agencies, dismantling transnational criminal and terrorist organizations.

DHS is working to secure U.S. borders through the deployment of personnel, technology, and infrastructure. The integration of intelligence and enforcement capabilities through intergovernmental task forces and partnerships has facilitated better information sharing, leading to the increased interdiction of drugs, weapons, and currency. By focusing on the largest threats and responding rapidly, DHS has strengthened security across the U.S. borders while facilitating international travel and trade.

Highlights for FY 2022 Q4 compared to FY 2021 Q4 include:

- U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) U.S. Border Patrol (USBP) encounters¹ decreased 2 percent in FY 2022 Q4 (574,319) compared to FY 2021 Q4 (583,664) (Table 1).
- CBP USBP encounters² of Mexican nationals decreased 1 percent in FY 2022 Q4 (156,661) compared to FY 2021 Q4 (158,851) (Table 2).
- CBP USBP encounters of non-Mexican nationals decreased 2 percent in FY 2022 Q4 (417,658) compared to FY 2021 Q4 (424,813) (Table 3).
- DHS removals increased by 64 percent in FY 2022 Q4 (32,329) compared to FY 2021 Q4 (19,720) (Table H1).
- DHS returns increased 38 percent in FY 2022 Q4 (67,804) compared to FY 2021 Q4 (49,256) (Table H1).
- DHS expulsions decreased 18 percent in FY 2022 Q4 (237,283) compared to FY 2021 Q4 (288,038) (Table H1).³

I. Legislative Language

This document was compiled pursuant to direction in the Joint Explanatory Statement accompanying the Fiscal Year (FY) 2022 Department of Homeland Security (DHS) Appropriations Act (P.L. 117-103). The Joint Explanatory Statement states:

Public Reporting of Operational Statistics.—The Department is directed to submit quarterly Border Security Status Reports and data on the removal of the parents of U.S.-born children semiannually, as in prior years.

II. Background

A. Overview of Congressional Mandate

This Border Security Status Report (BSSR) includes data for the fourth quarter (Q4) of FY 2022. The BSSR is a revised version of the Secure Border Initiative report, which last was released with data through FY 2010.

The original *Quarterly Status Report on the Department of Homeland Security's Border Security Performance and Resources* was provided in 2006 in response to a letter from the House Appropriations Committee. Data included in the BSSR often overlap with data in prior border security performance and resources reports; however, the BSSR excludes detailed program descriptions, accomplishments, and resource information. The list of data provided in this report was reviewed with committee staff and is described in Section B.

B. Data Presented

There are 25 figures and 19 tables in the body of this report and 32 tables in the appendix that provide data on the enforcement-related activities listed below. This report provides data on the following categories of border security and immigration enforcement-related activities:

- Encounters, administrative arrests, and inadmissible noncitizens;⁴
- Notices to appear (NTA);
- Criminal arrests;
- Authorized entries;
- Detention;
- Removals, returns, and expulsions;
- Worksite enforcement and E-Verify;
- Seizures: drugs, weapons, and currency;
- U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) and U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) staffing;
- Violence against CBP and ICE agents and officers; and
- Operation Stonegarden grants.

⁴ This report uses the word "noncitizen" to refer to individuals described under section 101(a)(3) of the Immigration and Nationality Act (INA).

C. Summary of Changes

Tables and figures were updated with data for the new reporting period and were updated to show this fiscal year's Q4 data. (Data for previous years are "locked" and are subject to limited updates.) Small variations and updates in Component-provided data may have occurred after FY 2021. Most data for FY 2020 were shifted from quarterly to single-year reporting and/or were moved to the appendix, as indicated.

III. Results/Analysis

DHS's Office of Immigration Statistics (OIS) compiles the BSSR from data received from DHS Components. Compilation of these data shows specifics and trends as indicated below.

A. Data Trends

Highlights for FY 2022 fourth quarter (Q4) compared to FY 2021 Q4 include:

- U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) U.S. Border Patrol (USBP) encounters⁵ decreased 2 percent in FY 2022 Q4 (574,319) compared to FY 2021 Q4 (583,664) (Table 1).
- CBP USBP encounters of Mexican nationals decreased 1 percent in FY 2022 Q4 (156,661) compared to FY 2021 Q4 (158,851) (Table 2).
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- DHS expulsions decreased 18 percent in FY 2022 Q4 (237,283) compared to FY 2021 Q4 (288,038) (Table H1).

Figures and tables in this section include notes about data sources and, where applicable, descriptions of changes in definitions over time or in data compared to past reports. Quarterly data, when not included in the Results/Analysis (Section III), are provided in appendices (Section IV, Appendix C, and Data Tables). Data included in this report were provided by CBP, ICE, and U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) and may differ from data independently reported by each Component because of differences in data compilation or reporting practices. Moreover, Component systems frequently are "living," meaning that such systems accept corrections, modifications, and new entries for a previously reported period. As a result, data provided to OIS are a snapshot as of a specific date (usually annotated in table or figure notes), and numbers retrieved on a subsequent date may differ from those originally provided.




Figure 1. CBP USBP Encounters: FYs 2018 to 2022




Figure 2. ICE HSI Administrative Arrests: FYs 2018 to 2022




Figure 3. ICE ERO Administrative Arrests: FYs 2018 to 2022




Figure 4. Noncitizens Determined Inadmissible by CBP Office of Field Operations (OFO): FYs 2018 to 2022




Figure 5. Encounters from IDENT by CBP USBP: FYs 2010 to 2022

C. Unique Individuals Encountered by CBP USBP (Figure 5)

With the Automated Biometric Identification System (IDENT), fingerprint records can be matched, making it possible to count both the number of unique individuals encountered and the total number of encounters (Figure 5). Because of data collection procedures, data are tabulated at the end of the fiscal year.




Figure 6. NTAs Issued by USCIS: FYs 2018 to 2022

D. NTAs Issued (Figures 6-9) and USCIS Fraud Cases Referred to ICE (Figure 10)

NTAs are served on noncitizens, and, once filed with an immigration court, civil immigration removal proceedings are initiated against a noncitizen before an immigration judge with the U.S. Department of Justice Executive Office for Immigration Review. This section includes NTAs issued by USCIS, CBP USBP, CBP OFO, and ICE ERO, as well as the number of USCIS fraud referrals submitted to ICE for criminal investigation. CBP's NTA issuance totals became erratic after commencement of enforcement of the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) Title 42 public health order in March 2020.




Figure 7. NTAs Issued by CBP USBP: FYs 2018 to 2022




Figure 8. NTAs Issued by CBP OFO: FYs 2018 to 2022




Figure 9. NTAs Issued by ICE ERO: FYs 2018 to 2022





Figure 10. USCIS Fraud Cases Referred to ICE for Investigation: FYs 2018 to 2022

E. Criminal Arrests (Figures 11-13)

Arrests refer to individuals (both noncitizens and U.S. citizens) arrested for violation of a federal and/or state criminal law or noncitizens who engaged in criminal conduct and were arrested for immigration violations. Criminal arrests may be for felony or misdemeanor charges and administrative arrests pursuant to immigration authorities. Criminal arrest data are provided for ICE HSI, ICE ERO, and CBP OFO.




Figure 12. ICE ERO Criminal Arrests: FYs 2018 to 2022




Figure 13. CBP OFO Criminal Arrests: FYs 2018 to 2022




Figure 14. Authorized Entries of U.S. Citizens and Noncitizens: FYs 2018 to 2022




Figure 15. Initial Book-Ins to ICE Detention Facilities: FYs 2018 to 2022

G. Detention (Figures 15-17 and Tables 6-8)

Removable noncitizens encountered by CBP and ICE who are determined to warrant custodial supervision are placed in detention facilities managed by ICE ERO. Noncitizens detained by ICE are housed in local or state government facilities under intergovernmental service agreements (IGSA), contract detention facilities, and ICE-owned facilities (service processing centers). ICE sometimes uses Federal Bureau of Prisons-controlled facilities to house individuals detained in immigration custody, but this practice generally is used in limited circumstances and is accomplished via an interagency agreement.




Figure 16. Average Daily Population (ADP) of Noncitizens in ICE ERO Detention: FYs 2018 to 2022




Figure 17. Average Length of Stay (in days) for Noncitizens Released from ICE ERO Detention: FYs 2018 to 2022




Figure 18. DHS Removals, Returns, and Expulsions: FYs 2018 to 2022

H. Removals, Returns, and Expulsions (Figure 18)

Noncitizen removals refer to repatriations of inadmissible or deportable noncitizens subject to a final order of removal, whereas returns refer to confirmed departures of inadmissible or deportable noncitizens not subject to a removal order. This report includes fiscal year removals and returns conducted by both CBP and ICE. A noncitizen who is removed may be subject to additional administrative or criminal consequences upon subsequent unauthorized reentry because of a previous removal. Starting on March 20, 2020, and through 2022, CBP expelled certain persons encountered at the border on public health grounds as part of the Department's efforts to assist in the implementation of the U.S. CDC's Title 42 public health order to limit the spread of Coronavirus Disease 2019. High numbers of Title 42 expulsions limited numbers of noncitizens processed under Title 8 immigration authority in FY 2020-FY 2022 and therefore reduced numbers of removals and returns.

The number of employers registered for E-Verify and the number of queries each year also are provided below. For the purposes of the E-Verify program, each query represents one new hire or new verification.




Figure 19. Worksite Enforcement – Criminal Fines: FYs 2018 to 2022




Figure 20. Worksite Enforcement – Civil Fines: FYs 2018 to 2022




Figure 21. ICE HSI Worksite Criminal Arrests – Owners/Employers: FYs 2018 to 2022




Figure 22. ICE HSI Worksite Criminal Arrests – Employees/Other: FYs 2018 to 2022




Figure 23. Employers Newly Registered in E-Verify: FYs 2018 to 2022




Figure 24. E-Verify Employer Queries: FYs 2018 to 2022 Q4




Figure 25. CBP USBP Agents and CBP OFO Officers: FYs 2018 to 2022

IV. Appendices

Appendix A. Glossary

287(g) Program - A state and local cross-designation program authorized by the Immigration and Nationality Act (INA) § 287(g). This program provides specific officers of participating state and local law enforcement agencies with the necessary delegation of authority, training, and resources to perform certain functions of an immigration officer under the direction and oversight of U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE).

Administrative Arrest - The arrest of a noncitizen who is charged with removability under INA.

Average Daily Population - Average daily detention population for the months included in the reporting period.

Average Length of Stay in Detention - The mean length of stay in detention from the time of initial admission to the time of release for those noncitizens released during the reporting period. Noncitizens in detention at the end of the reporting period are excluded from the calculation.

Consequence Delivery System - A U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP)-developed system that guides management and agents through a process that is designed to evaluate each individual apprehended by the CBP U.S. Border Patrol (USBP) and to identify the most appropriate consequence on the basis of the individual's crossing history. The Consequence Delivery System initially was implemented in the Tucson Sector in January 2011 and now is deployed across the Southwest Border.

Deportable Noncitizen under INA § 237 - A noncitizen in and admitted to the United States subject to any grounds of deportability specified in section 237 of the INA, 8 U.S.C. § 1227. This includes, but is not limited to, noncitizens who are in the United States without authorization because of fraud or misrepresentation or who entered with authorization but subsequently violated the terms of their nonimmigrant classification or status or committed a criminal offense that renders them deportable.

E-Verify - An Internet-based system administered by U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) in partnership with the U.S. Social Security Administration that allows employers to verify the employment eligibility of workers electronically.

Encounter Data - These data include USBP Title 8 apprehensions, Office of Field Operations (OFO) Title 8 inadmissibles, and Title 42 expulsions for Fiscal Years (FY) 2020, 2021, and 2022.

Expulsion - When a noncitizen is expelled under Title 42 authority to their country of last transit or, if a noncitizen cannot be returned to the country of last transit, to their country of origin.

Inadmissible Noncitizen - A noncitizen ineligible to receive visas or ineligible to be admitted to the United States on the basis of one or more grounds of inadmissibility described in section 212 of the INA, 8 U.S.C. § 1182.

Queries - For the purposes of the E-Verify program, each query represents one new hire or new verification.

Removals - The compulsory and confirmed movement of an inadmissible or deportable noncitizen out of the United States based on an order of removal. Ineligibility to remain in the United States is based on grounds of inadmissibility under INA § 212 or deportability under INA § 237. A noncitizen who is removed may be subject to additional administrative and/or criminal consequences with respect to subsequent unauthorized reentry owing to the fact of the removal. This report includes removals effectuated by both ICE and CBP.

Returns - The confirmed movement of an inadmissible or deportable noncitizen out of the United States not based on an order of removal. Ineligibility to remain in the United States is based on grounds of inadmissibility under INA § 212 or deportability under INA § 237. Noncitizens may withdraw their applications for admission and/or choose to depart the United States and return to their home countries in lieu of removal proceedings. This report includes returns effectuated by both ICE and CBP.

Seizure - Taking physical possession and/or control of property, merchandise, or other articles from the possession or control of an individual or establishment.

Violence against CBP OFO Officers – Actual or perceived physical threats or elevated use of force against CBP OFO personnel. Along with physical assaults, violent incidents involve vehicles being operated in a manner that poses a risk or harm or the use or intended use of a deadly weapon.

Violence against CBP USBP Agents - Any assault directed at CBP USBP agents in the performance of or with a nexus to their official duties, including, but not limited to, rockings, shootings, vehicular assaults, other physical assaults, and any other threat of bodily harm or death.
